## Fertility Data Collected by the U.S. Census Bureau

#### 1. Current Population Survey (CPS) June Fertility Supplement

- SAMPLE: Women aged 15-50
- FREQUENCY: Asked every 2 years (cross-sectional)
- CONTENT: Asks about children ever born & information about first birth

#### 2. American Community Survey (ACS)

- SAMPLE: Women aged 15-50
- FREQUENCY: Asked on an on-going basis (released as annual estimates, cross-sectional)
- CONTENT: Asks about birth in the past year

#### 3. Survey of Income and Program Participation (SIPP)

- SAMPLE: All adults (age 15+)
- FREQUENCY: Asked annually (longitudinal; ~4 years per panel)
- CONTENT: Collects a full fertility history





# The Survey of Income and Program Participation (SIPP)

- Administered by the U.S. Census Bureau since 1984
- Longitudinal survey of a nationally representative sample of the civilian, non-institutionalized population
- Follows the same people over time, usually a few years
- Collects detailed socioeconomic, demographic, and relationship information


### 2014 SIPP Redesign

- Expanded collection of fertility data
  - ❖ Full fertility histories of women AND men 15+
  - Direct question about Multiple Partner Fertility



### Background: Aging population

The 65-and-older population grew by over a third from 2010 to 2019, and by 3.2% from 2018 to 2019





## Aging population; Changing family dynamics

- Changing family dynamics impact the pool of potential caregivers available to adults as they age (Seltzer and Bianchi, 2013; Stone, 2015).
- Majority of older people with a disability reside at home (He and Larsen, 2014).
- Upon turning age 65, over half of individuals can expect the need for someone to help them with activities of daily living or will require supervision for at least 90 days or longer (Favreault and Dey, 2016).

# Who are the Childless Older Adults?






## Demographic Characteristics

- The majority of childless older adults are non-Hispanic White and native-born
- 79.0 percent of childless adults are non-Hispanic White, compared to
   72.8 percent of parents
- Almost 90 percent of childless adults were native-born, compared to
   84.7 percent of parents









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# Compared to older childless men, older childless women...

- Have higher median personal net worth than childless men
- Are more likely to consider themselves in excellent, very good, or good health than childless men



#### Conclusion

- One in six older adults in the United States is childless (15.2 million)
- Childless older adults have fewer potential supports within their household, but also higher levels of personal net worth and education
- Childless older adult population is multifaceted
